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Bowl-ed over: Frankfort wins, 22-13 Falcons end five-game losing streak in Mineral Bowl; improve to 8-1 on the season

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KEYSER—Keyser's six-game winning streak? Over.

Their perfect record at their new stadium? Gone.

Five straight wins in the Mineral Bowl, the longest-ever streak in the rivalry? Kaput.

The Frankfort Falcons wouldn't have it any other way.

James Jones' 65-yard touchdown pass to Jeremy Miltenberger with three minutes left broke open a tight game and gave the Falcons a 22-13 win over the Keyser Golden Tornado on Friday night at Tornado Alley.

Just as significant: the Falcons' two-point conversion on a fake extra point in the first quarter that gave them the lead for good.

It's the Falcons' first win in the series since a 13-6 triumph in 2003.

Frankfort received to start the game, and Joey Luciw got the Falcons off to a great start, returning the ball to the Keyser 40.

Dalton Brown rushed for eight yards on first down, and, after a false start penalty, gained four yards.

Luciw moved the sticks with a seven-yard scamper.

Three plays later, after a penalty set up third-and-17, James Jones connected with Logan Wolford for a 16-yard gain.

On fourth down, Brown pushed the pile for two yards.

But two plays later, Jones fumbled on a run to the right, and Wes Washington scooped and returned the ball to the Frankfort 22 with 7:10 left.

After an offside penalty on first down and a one-yard loss by R.C. Pratt, Scott Kitrell moved the chains with a six-yard run.

A false start set up first-and-15 for Keyser, then Kitrell, David Echartea, and Kitrell again moved the ball within one yard of the markers.

On fourth-and-1 at the Frankfort 3, Kitrell got the call, and picked up two yards and the first down.

Tyler Biser kept for the one-yard touchdown, and, with Kitrell's kick true, the Golden Tornado took a 7-0 lead with 3:33 left in the first quarter.

The Falcons continued to look good running the ball, though, starting from their own 28 and quickly moving the chains on second down.

After Brown carried for four, Jeremy Miltenberger moved the ball across



midfield with an 11-yard run to the left side.

Brown toted for eight more to the Keyser 33,

then picked up the first down with a five-yard run.

The Falcons faced third-and-6 as the second

quarter started, and converted on a Jones-to-Wolford hookup for eight yards.

Brown cashed in the pigskin with a pair of runs, the second from five yards.

Fort Hill thrashes Mountain Ridge, 51-7; dims Miners' playoff hopes

CUMBERLAND—Mountain Ridge may have been at home last night but Fort Hill did their best to make Miner Stadium feel like Green Way Avenue. Sentinel fans packed the away bleachers to capacity as they watched their red and white roll to win number nine by way of a 51-7 victory over the Miners.

The opening kickoff was taken by Mountain Ridge but after only two plays, Fort Hill had the football.

Ryan Delaney's pass was intercepted and returned to the Miner five yard line, and one carry by Dakota Welsh made it 7-0 Sentinels only 54 seconds into the game.

Mountain Ridge went

three-and-out on the ensuing possession and set up to punt on their own 29 yard line. The punt was fielded by Devin Lee at his 28 and was returned 72 yards for six.

The extra point made it 14-0 FH with 8:56 on the first quarter game clock.

Mountain Ridge showed their first sign on life seconds later, as Keinan Harper took the ensuing kickoff 95 yards to the house for the Miners' only score on the evening.

The ball exchanged hands two more times before Fort Hill found the end zone on a 68 yard connection from Devin Lee to his split end to make it 21-7 Sentinels with 3:55 to play in the first frame.

Another good return by Harper set up MR at their

28 and the drive went six plays before a fumble gave Fort Hill the ball at the Miner 36.

It took the Sentinels eleven plays to move 36 yards, and two minutes into the second quarter, Fort Hill led 28-7.

Mountain Ridge mixed things up by running a wildcat offense on their next possession but were forced into another three-and-out. Hovatter stood on his own ten yard line to punt and Sentinel players flew in off the corner for the block and FH took over at the Ridge two yard line.

Two runs of one yard apiece resulted in another Welsh end zone trip but Fort Hill couldn't add the point after, so the lead stood at 34-7.

Another Miner three-play drive and another

Hovatter punt gave the Sentinels the ball on their 32.

Two plays later, Lee hit Sam Walker for a 66 yarder which gave his team a 41-7 advantage with 4:24 seconds remaining in the half.

That was the same score as the players headed for the locker rooms.

Lee was four of seven for 168 yards and two touchdowns to go with his 72 yard punt return for a score. Welsh carried eight times for only 19 yards, but he found the end zone three times in the first 24 minutes.

Fort Hill received the second half kick at their 44 on a failed outside kick by Mountain Ridge.

Five plays and a minute and a half later, Walker took it in from five yards out to make it 48-7 Fort Hill and by way of

Maryland's 35-point mercy rule, the game clock would run without stopping the rest of the way.

The second string took over for the Sentinels on the next drive and the

defense held strong against the Miners, as the eleven play MR drive ended in a fumble that the Sentinels took out to midfield.

WVU women travel to No. 9 Rutgers for BIG EAST quarterfinals Sunday

MORGANTOWN—The West Virginia women's soccer team's quest for its second BIG EAST Championship in three years begins Sunday at Rutgers' Yurcak Field.

The Mountaineers travel to Piscataway, N.J., to battle the ninth-ranked Scarlet Knights at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 1.

The Mountaineers are coming off a 1-0 win at Providence on Oct. 25 that earned coach Nikki Izzo-Brown her 200th career win. Izzo-Brown improved her 15-year record as a head coach to 200-80-31, including a 14-year mark of 187-75-31 at WVU.

"It was a nice moment but more importantly we got the win to help us earn a bye," says Izzo-Brown, when asked about her milestone victory. "It was great to win but you know what,

201 is more important to me right now. All I'm gearing up for is win number 201. That means we advanced and that is what is most important for this team and this program."

The Mountaineers finished third in the BIG EAST American Division standings to earn a first-round bye for the fifth straight season. Rutgers also earned an opening-round bye after finishing second in the BIG EAST National Division.

"I think the bye is critical for us from a rest standpoint," says Izzo-Brown whose team is competing in its 10th-straight BIG EAST tournament.

"We closed out the regular season on the road over the past two weekends, and then have to get back on the road to play at Rutgers. It is critical for us to kind of collect ourselves, get healthy, get rested and

move forward."

West Virginia leads the all-time series with Rutgers by an 8-4-1 count and has won six of the last eight meetings.

Last season, however, the Scarlet Knights posted a 1-0 victory in Piscataway during regular season play.

The last three meetings have all been decided by one-goal margins and WVU is 2-3-1 all-time in games played at Rutgers with wins coming in 2002 and 2004. West Virginia is 1-1 all-time against Rutgers in BIG EAST tournament play with both matches played in Storrs, Conn.

"I think it is a great matchup with both teams having some similarities in their systems of play," says Izzo-Brown. "Going in and playing a team we did not see in the regular season is where we want to be. We are excited to have the opportunity to extend our

season against a ranked opponent like Rutgers."

The Mountaineers are led by two-time captain and All-American midfielder Carolyn Blank. The reigning BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year has started every match in her career, totaling 88 career starts.

Her 88th career start at Providence last weekend pushed her past former All-Americans Chrissie Abbott and Lisa Stoia as the program's career starts leader.

The BIG EAST Championship is set for Nov. 6 and 8 at Joseph J. Morrone Stadium on the campus of Connecticut. The semifinals will be televised live on CBS College Sports at 5:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. on Nov. 6, with the title game set for noon ET on Nov. 8. The championship match also will be shown locally on numerous regional sports networks.

Echartea gained just two yards on the next two plays, then a pass interference call gave Keyser a first down.

At the Frankfort 18, KHS was flagged for a false start.

Echartea ran for eight, then Evans lost three.

Biser, rolling left, floated the ball towards Jonathan Moats in the end zone, but the pass was broken up.

Out of a timeout, KHS false started.

On fourth-and-15 with 1:09 left in the half, Biser was sacked to turn the ball over on downs.

Jones went to work,

hitting Luciw for 31 yards. But four incomplete passes, including a near-interception by Kadeem Garland on fourth down, gave the ball back to KHS on downs.

The Golden Tornado ran one play and let the first half end.

Kitrell returned to start the half for Keyser, carrying for five yards, and Echartea gained five more to nose the sticks forward.

But Keyser went nowhere on their next three plays and punted for the first time.

On second down, Jones found Brian Bills for 14 yards to the FHS 41.

Daniel McCormick's first touch of the night went for 11 yards and another first down across midfield.

Two plays later, Jeremy Miltenberger bit off 15 yards, then followed it with 14 more.

McCormick's ten-yard run moved the ball to the Keyser 7.

After two runs for no gain, Luciw gained six yards on a toss play to the Keyser 1.

The Falcons took a timeout facing fourth-and-goal.

Jones kept for a vital touchdown, and Wolford added to his area record for consecutive extra points with a boot down the middle.

Frankfort led, 15-7, with 4:50 left in the third quarter.

Keyser went three-and-out, and Frankfort took over after the punt at their own 33.

After McCormick carried for six, Jones was sacked by a host of Tornado defenders for a loss of 10 and KHS had the quick stop they wanted.

Miltenberger's punt was a good one, and Keyser started from their own 33.

On third down, Echartea gained 23 yards on a draw play to give Keyser a vital first down—also, Frankfort was flagged for a personal foul.

A two-yard run by Kitrell ended the third quarter.

On fourth down two plays later, the big full-back moved the chains with a nine-yard run.

Kitrell and Biser ran for two apiece, then a pass into the end zone was incomplete.

Fourth-and-six: Biser again dropped back to pass, and, again, the pass fell incomplete.

Frankfort took over on downs with 8:35 left.

But the Golden Tornado defense held: the Falcons went three-and-out.

Keyser took over in Falcon territory at the 48 with 6:34 left.

A hold nullified a long Echartea run on first down.

On second down, Biser completed a pass to Pratt for 15 yards, then Echartea picked up the first down.

Two plays later, the same passing combination gained the same amount of turf.

Biser, suddenly hot,

then hit Kadeem Garland in the right corner of the end zone for a 20-yard touchdown pass.

But his heave on the two-point conversion was intercepted.

Frankfort still led, 15-13, with 4:10 left.

After two short runs, the riverboat gambler that is Kevin Whiteman went to the air.

Play action, Jones to Miltenberger, 65 yards, a backbreaker of a touch-

down.

Wolford's kick led, 22-13.

On the kickoff, things got better for the blue-and-white: Pratt fumbled, and Bills recovered for FHS.

The Falcons ran a minute off of the clock, then Jones was intercepted in the end zone on fourth down.

Keyser started from their own 20 with 1:36 left.

After gaining one first down, Biser was intercepted downfield by Dylan Wagoner.

The Falcons took a knee and celebrated the end of their drought in the cross-county series.

Keyser leads the overall series, 21-14.

Keyser (6-3) closes the regular season against Mountain Ridge next week.

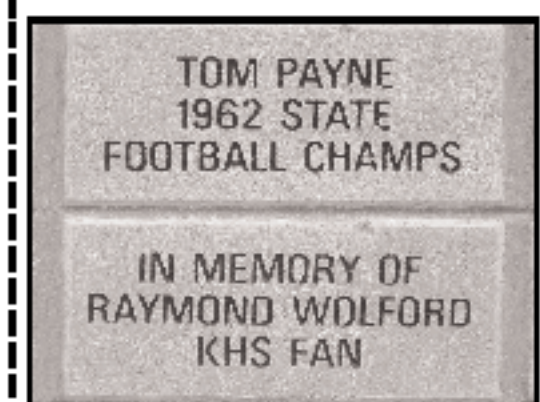
Frankfort (8-1) hosts Hampshire next Friday.

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Bats look to break out as Series shifts to Philly

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Derek Jeter almost seems to delight in the way this World Series is playing out.

Forget all those power hitters. Pitching is priceless.

"I told you," he said with a smile.

Without any offense from Alex Rodriguez, Jeter and the New York Yankees totaled four runs in the first two games and still eked out a split at home. Now, the Series shifts to Philadelphia for Game 3 on Saturday night, with Cole Hamels set to start for the Phillies against fellow lefty Andy Pettitte.

Three wins from a second consecutive championship, Philadelphia could wrap it up at home. Chase Utley, Jimmy Rollins and crew can't wait to play before their fervent fans in the second-ever World Series game on Halloween. "We're back in our own ballpark. It's going to be hostile. It's going to be loud," Shane Victorino said.

Nothing new, according to the Yankees.

"Because of the team we are, we get booed and yelled at everywhere we go," Johnny Damon said. "Even coming off the train."

Citizens Bank Park is approximately 108 miles from Yankee Stadium, with all those New Jersey Turnpike tolls in between. Both teams zipped down on the train in a little more than an hour — the Phillies after their 3-1 loss Thursday night, the Yankees on Friday afternoon.

During batting practice, as one slugger after another sent balls ricocheting around Philadelphia's cozy ballpark, it was hard to fathom how Cliff Lee and A.J. Burnett looked so dominant on the mound the previous two nights.

"I can't say enough about our advanced scouting and our reports. They're right on," Phillies manager Charlie Manuel said.

Sooner or later, though, some of these big bats are bound to break loose.

Mark Teixeira's only hit in seven at-bats is a solo homer. Phillies bopper Ryan Howard is hitting .222 with six strikeouts. A monster in the playoffs,

Rodriguez is 0 for 8 in his first World Series, also with six strikeouts.

"I feel pretty good. I mean, it's only been eight at-bats, but I felt like I've had a lot of good swings," he said. "I fouled a couple of pitches off that I should have put in play."

A-Rod was mostly an October bust before this year, but Jeter insisted he's not worried.

"No, the guy's been killing the ball for three weeks," Jeter said. "It's kind of hard to sit here and overanalyze things. If pitchers make their pitches, they're going to get you out."

Damon said the rest of the Yankees need to pick up the slack for Rodriguez. But with offense at a premium, they'll be missing a dangerous bat during the next three games.

Because World Series rules do not allow a designated hitter in the National League park, New York must decide whether to put Hideki Matsui in the outfield or on the bench.

"As productive as he's been for us this year, you don't want to lose his bat," manager Joe Girardi said.

Matsui hit a go-ahead homer off Pedro Martinez in Game 2 and it might seem tempting to start him in right field in place of slumping Nick Swisher. Slowed by knee surgeries, however, Matsui hasn't played the outfield since June 15, 2008, at Houston. He appeared in right field only three times that year, all in April.

Matsui was stationed in right during batting practice and jogged after a few fungos, but it was hardly an intense workout.

"I don't see any major issues," he said through a translator. "At this point, the way I feel, I think it should be fine. I mean, again, you really have to try and then see how it feels."

Speaking before his team took the field, Girardi didn't disclose his plans.

KEYSER—It's not a surprise that the Keyser Steelers and Cumberland Patriots will vie for both the junior varsity (1:00 p.m. at Greenway Avenue Stadium) and varsity (3:00 p.m. at Greenway) titles in the Cumberland Area Youth Football League on Sunday.

Keyser, who joined the league in 1973 under the sponsorship of the Keyser Jaycees, will be making their 17th appearance in the title game and have won nine titles.

The league was founded in 1967: its founding fathers were Rich Cioni, Chet Payne, Jack Ruggles,

Advising the league founder and helping to write the by-laws was Nick Saban of Fairmont, father of the current Alabama coach of the same name and brother of former NFL coach Lou Saban.

Along with the team goal of winning the Super Bowl, Sunday's players will also be hoping to take home several individual honors: the William Bruce Lynn Memorial Award for league MVP, the Alfred "Biz" Manges Memorial Award for the Super Bowl MVP, and the James R. Steckman Memorial Award

Lynn was a former league officer and commissioner. He was a 1954 graduate of Fort Hill and a three-sport star for the Sentinels.

He was killed in a car accident on July 13, 1968.

WVU volleyball blocks out UConn

MORGANTOWN—The West Virginia University volleyball team posted 14 team blocks to defeat BIG EAST foe Connecticut this evening at Hampel Pavilion in Storrs, Conn.

"We are excited to beat a very good Connecticut team," coach Veronica Hammersmith says. "It means a lot to us, as we are trying to reach our goal of getting into the conference championship. I think we played really well tonight."

The Mountaineers improved to 14-11, 4-6, after defeating the Huskies (12-13, 5-4) in a 3-1 (25-15, 24-26, 27-25, 25-22) match.

Set one started with a 2-1 Mountaineer lead after a pair of kills from junior middle blocker Abby Norman and senior outside hitter Kristina Gallahan. UConn then answered with a few tough blocks to gain a 7-5 advantage. However, the lead was short-lived after a

service ace from sophomore outside hitter Kylie Armbruster sent the Mountaineers on a 15-0 run, their longest of the season, as Norman and Gallahan controlled the net. The Huskies tried to come back, but were shut down after a kill from sophomore outside hitter Michelle Kopecky ended the set.

The Huskies rebounded in set two, as they dominated the Mountaineers throughout most of the set. Down, 20-23, WVU came back to tie after a kill from junior middle block Lauren Evans, followed by a WVU block and another kill from Armbruster. Refusing to fall, UConn fought back as Allison Nickel ended the set with a kill.

UConn carried the momentum into set three as it started with a 5-0 lead until a kill from Norman put the Mountaineers on the board. With the Huskies in the lead, 12-8, Armbruster took control to bring the Mountaineers

back for the tie. The two teams battled for the rest of the set as they once again found themselves tied at 24. After a kill from Mattison Quayle to put UConn up by one, Gallahan answered with a kill and a service ace for a WVU lead, as Armbruster once again stepped up for a kill to win the set.

The fourth set proved to be just as exciting until sophomore setter Kari Post gave the Mountaineers a 23-21 advantage. Gallahan added another kill for WVU, while Evans posted a kill for the win.

Junior libero Bonnie West also had a good match with 30 digs, while Post recorded her 11th double-double of the season with 38 assists and 16 digs.

As a team, WVU recorded 52 kills, 89 digs and six service aces.

The Mountaineers are set to continue conference play with a 2 p.m. match at St. John's on Sunday, Nov. 1.

MORGANTOWN—West Virginia University freshman Deniz Kilicli will not participate in the first 20 regular season games of the 2009-10 basketball season, the school announced today.

The NCAA determined that prior to his enrollment at WVU, Kilicli played on a team in Turkey during the 2007-08 season, which included a

professional player.

This is not permissible under NCAA amateurism regulations.

A 6-foot-9 forward from Istanbul, Turkey, Kilicli attended Mountain State Academy in Beckley in 2008-09 and was ranked as the 15th-best forward and the 44th-best recruit in the 2009 class by ESPN.com.

Coach Bob Huggins will have no comment on the matter.
